Looking to the future

With Amazon's plans to locate its new East Coast Headquarters in Arlington, Virginia,, and to create 25,000 new jobs, JMU is in a prime location for the company's hiring efforts, especially since the Amazon hiring manager is a JMU alumnus.

The new College of Business Learning Complex opened in Fall 2020 as a nearly \$100 million investment to JMU's campus. The new complex includes the space for the COB's digital marketing program; a center for innovation, collaboration and entrepreneurship; and a Capital Markets lab with Bloomberg terminals and a ticker-tape.
